The Impact of Education Beyond the Classroom

My Story: How Teaching Abroad Transformed My Vision of Education

It was during the summer of 2006 when I completed my college degree and embarked on a life-changing flight. I clearly remember boarding my Delta Boeing 787 with nonstop service to Seoul, South Korea. Upon contemplating my future, I wanted to do something completely unusual, to inspire and travel the world; feeling ever so motivated I signed up to teach abroad as an English missionary teacher. It was there in the "Land of the Morning Calm" where I set aside my worries, put into practice everything my very own teachers had taught me, and learned about the true meaning of education. The experience was incredible; so much so that what was originally supposed to be only a six-month endeavor turned into a three years commitment. I taught a variety of ages and groups and made friendships that I still cherish today; and thanks to the incredible opportunity, I gained valuable teaching experience and became the professional I am today.

I share this anecdote to demonstrate that education doesn't only happen within the classroom. Today, in 2025, learning has diversified enormously, with opportunities that transcend national borders and traditional teaching methods. With the digitalization of learning, the rise of remote work, and the automation of jobs, knowledge is acquired in multiple ways: through online courses, work experiences, specialized certifications, mentorships, and even gamification. For centuries, education has been a pillar of socio-cultural development and an economic engine worldwide. Its impact undoubtedly transcends traditional classrooms, shaping not only academic knowledge but also people's ability to adapt to a constantly changing world.

This is a certainty, and we want to explore its benefits, staying at the forefront of modern pedagogical opportunities. Education is and will continue to be the foundation of progress, but its future depends on its ability to adapt and remain worthwhile. Facing current challenges with resilience and creativity will be crucial in ensuring that education not only prepares for employment but also for success in life in general. We are pleased to announce that four of the programs are now pending approval from the Puerto Rico Postsecondary Institutional Board (JIP). In the meantime, we are actively preparing the submission of the remaining program, with the goal of launching these new offerings during the Fall Trimester of 2025 (FA25-TRI).



The MSN in Critical Care or Geriatric Care equips registered nurses with advanced expertise to deliver top-notch care to critically ill patients and the elderly. It trains nurses for leadership, education, and teamwork roles within inter-professional care teams. The program blends theoretical learning with practical experience in the chosen specialty.

MBA-**Human Resources**

The MBA program with a specialization in Human Resources offers students the opportunity to acquire the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to excel as specialists in human capital management. Students will be prepared to meet the demands of an increasingly complex and competitive business environment at both local and international levels.

Skin and Wound Care Certification

This specialized program is designed for healthcare professionals seeking advanced skills in skin and wound care. Topics include skin assessment, wound identification/classification, acute and chronic wound management, dressing application and pressure injury prevention. Students are thoroughly prepared in this

- GPA
- Financial need (FAFSA)
- Letters of recommendation
- Personal statement

What's in It for You?

- Scholarship funds distributed equally across academic terms (up to one year).
- Opportunities to participate in activities designed to enhance your skills and knowledge in your chosen field.

How to Apply

- Fill out the eligibility form.
- Submit your GPA, recommendation letters, and personal statement.
- The PPOHA Scholarship Committee will review your application and notify you if selected.
